We understand that some of our students who catch public transport arrive slightly before 8:40am. These children are asked to wait outside the school office area on the round, circular seat. until 8:40am.



Creating a Culture of Thinking at BHPS - Our Expectations

The expectations that we have for students guide our actions as teachers. Likewise, as parents, the expectations that you have for your children, guide your interactions with them. With this in mind, how can we work together to build an amazing learning culture for those in our care?

As teachers and as parents, are we:

Focusing students on the learning or the work?

Do we ask – *Have you finished your work*? or *What have your learned*? I think, as a parent I am more likely to ask my children about their learning at school each day, not what work they have completed. Learning focused homes and classrooms and schoolbooks allow for children to make mistakes, can look messy or be noisy, but are safe places where children try new things, develop their ideas and are expressive and creative. *Teaching for understanding or just knowledge*?

We need to acquire knowledge, but what do we do with it? How is it used, applied, discussed and analysed? As parents and teachers, can we challenge our children to apply what they have learned to think about new and novel situations and uses for it? If your child has just learned the meaning of addition, how many different ways can they put it to use in the home?

Encouraging deep or just surface learning?

How can we ask children to interact, use, compare, plan, manipulate, explain, assess or justify their learning? What methods of processing or thinking do we allow children? Do we just tell them answers, or do we really get them thinking and for themselves? At home, children could plan how they will spend their pocket money. They could plan and cook something in a set budget. They could help work out how much paint, pavers, soil etc, is needed for that next project.

Promoting independent or dependent learners?

When children are excited about their learning they naturally WANT to learn. Rescuing students who are in the "muddle" of a problem limits their chance of getting their 'ah ha' moments. Some of the benefits of independence are resilience, openness and willingness to accept challenges, motivation, collaboration, increased self-esteem and developing lifelong learners.

Developing children with a growth or a fixed mindset?

Do we believe that we are born with fixed abilities or are we able to grow our abilities? As parents and teachers, believing that our children can learn and will grow up to be amazing is what our jobs are all about!
