Harmony Week - Everyone Belongs

Harmony Week is celebrated from 15th to 21st March this year.

Harmony Week celebrates Australia's cultural diversity. It's about inclusiveness, respect and a sense of belonging for everyone.

Did you know?

- Nearly half (49 per cent) of Australians were born overseas or have at least one parent who was.
- We identify with over 300 ancestries.
- Since 1945, more than 7.5 million people have migrated to Australia.
- 85 per cent of Australians agree multiculturalism has been good for Australia.
- Apart from English, the most common languages spoken in Australia are Mandarin, Arabic, Cantonese, Vietnamese, Italian, Greek, Tagalog/Filipino, Hindi, Spanish and Punjabi.
- More than 70 Indigenous languages are spoken in Australia.

At Bellevue we are so lucky to have students representing 37 language groups. It certainly adds to the beautiful tapestry that makes up our school staff and student body.

It is with absolute delight that I can announce that our OSHC has been assessed for its education and care service (under section136 of the Education and Care Services National Law). The result is that all seven standards have been rated as having achieved the National Quality Standard (NQS) and the National Regulations with respect




Finally, we are looking forward to our twilight sports day! The students have been busy preparing their chants and practising their events. It should be a grand day.

What Might Happen if We Add Another 1/4 Cup of Flour?

While students had an extra-long, long weekend, the teachers at Bellevue spent the day looking closely at our School Improvement Plan and thoughtfully considered ways to deliver an even deeper program of learning. Marie-Louise explored aspects of our literacy goals, whilst Mary examined key elements of numeracy.

Our third goal around stretching our children, focused on the Culture of Thinking at our school. As teachers become confident to use thinking protocols, we see all children regularly involved in conversations and discussions on key areas of their learning. They are generating ideas, considering different viewpoints, analyzing options, reflecting, listening and responding to others, debating - just to name a few of the many facets of language being used.

Learning conversations are so important. In our current busy climate, we need to be careful not to let go of regular conversation in the home, at meal time, while driving home from school, when shopping, when cooking, at bed times, when playing together.

Think about how a child's vocabulary is expanded and concepts are developed when these conversations introduce, boost and reinforce new ideas, words and learning.

Here are some ideas to try. Ask your child how they would solve a real-life problem, why they think something is significant, to predict an outcome, to create a new ending for a bedtime story, to role-play, to conduct a survey, to give their opinion, to plan something.

My side-dish take-away from the pupil free day – Talking, talking, talking – two-way conversations are paramount and indispensable in the evolving development of learning.

National definition of bullying for schools

Developed by educators across Australia

Bullying is an **ongoing** and **deliberate misuse of power** in relationships through **repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour** that intends to cause physical, social and/or psychological **harm**. It can involve an **individual or a group** misusing their power, or perceived power, over one or more persons who feel unable to stop it from happening.

Bullying can happen in person or online, via various digital platforms and devices, and it can be obvious (overt) or hidden (covert). Bullying behaviour is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time (for example, through sharing of digital records).

Bullying of any form or for any reason can have **immediate, medium and long-term effects** on those involved, including **bystanders**. Single incidents and conflict or fights between equals, whether in person or online, are not defined as bullying.

What we can do

Student tips

If it happens in person, try these:

- Ignore them. Try not to show any reaction.
- Tell them to stop and walk away.
- Pretend you don't care.
- Go somewhere safe.
- Get support from your friends.

If it happens online, try these:

- Avoid responding to the bullying.
- Report and block anyone who is bullying online.
- Protect yourself online using privacy settings and keep records.

If you see someone being bullied:

- Leave negative conversations. Don't join in.
- Support others being bullied.

If it doesn't stop:

- Talk to an adult (parent/carer/teacher) who can help stop the bullying.
- Keep asking for support until the bullying stops.

Parent tips

If your child talks to you about bullying:

- 1. Listen calmly and get the whole story.
- Reassure your child that they are not to blame.
- Ask your child what they want you to do about it and how you can help.
- Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find strategies.
- 5. Check in regularly with your child.


School Building Fund


BELLEVUE HEIGHTS JUNIOR FIELD NATURALISTS' CLUB
