Last week I had an incredible time representing South Australia in the inaugural U12 Girls AFL team.

In term 1 school holidays I went to three days of trials with about 80 other girls. This was cut to 30 and after 2 more trainings a squad of 23 was selected. Every Friday afternoon I left school early and went to Golden Grove for trainings.

Last week all states and territories except Northern Territory and Tasmania travelled to Adelaide for the national carnival. On Sunday there was an opening ceremony at Norwood Oval where most of our games were played. On Sunday we played our first game against NSW, which we won.

We ended up winning four out of five games losing to Victoria on Friday by three points. Highlights of the week were winning against WA by one point when we were 20 points down at half time and winning the fair play award voted by the coaches and team managers of the other states and territories. The SA boys also won the fair play award and the gold medal.



Throughout the week we had team bonding activities which included visiting the state library to see the SANFL exhibition, ten pin bowling, laser skirmish, Bounce, and a recovery session at the beach. On Tuesday we didn't play and had a rest day but went to a session on nutrition and injury prevention

Around the Classes

Junior R-3

In JP classes students are working on imaginative narrative writing. They are involved in sprints-maths activities to improve their understanding, fluency, problem-solving and reasoning. R/1 and 2/3 classes are investigating "Living things", their basic needs, external features and different characteristics of life stages. The 1/2 class are learning about natural resources, the use and effects on our environment. We are exploring our roles of global citizenship and discussing the actions how to make our planet more sustainable. In Performing Arts, JP students are learning about green screen technology and will begin to film class movies in the coming weeks.

Middle Yr 3/4

Year 4

We are learning about fractions and using dominos and other manipulatives in order to gain more confidence with fractions, they are also learning about money. We are also writing a narrative about The Enormous Crocodile. Hass - In Civics and Citizenship we are learning and the difference between rules and laws and why we need them to keep everyone safe at school, at home, playing sport and in the community. We are also creating farm pictures using modelling clay in preparation for our Urrbrae excursion this Wednesday. Room 19 are getting ready to host assembly in week 6 and will share photos and writing about our excursion.

Upper 5/6

The Potato Olympics are here in Rm 14! We have created potato athletes and are writing creative narratives about our potato characters, measuring their athletic events (mass, height, jump distance and rolling speed) along with investigating the nutritional value of the potato vegetable.

In Room 17 we have been learning how to write effective summaries. Summarising means to retell the main ideas from a text in your own words. When summarising a text it is important to identify the story elements, retell the main ideas in your own words, use key words or phrases and use connective words such as next, so, then or after. This term in Design Technology we have been designing and building their own working pinball machines with a particular theme in mind. Students have been working in CLT's (collaborative learning teams) and doing a lot of communication, critical thinking and problem solving to achieve the goal.

Science with Mr Nicholson

In Science this term: the 5/6s have been investigating electricity and the 3/4s have been investigating forces. I'm grateful I've had an online virtual lab for the year 5 and 6 students to experiment with making circuits - no real-life electrocutions or fires to report! The year 3 and 4 students rather enjoyed experiencing the forces involved in tug of war recently, up to a point. I think students could attest that really even teams increases tugging time and subsequently the amount of friction felt on their hands!

Connecting with another person's idea requires and develops a higher level of understanding.


When students work together they get opportunities to make connections between ideas, which is inherently valuable for them. Every morning we work on different mathematical tasks. This is what we do:
